Elmbrook Discussion Questions 1st Corinthians 13 - These Three Remain

And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love. (1 Corinthians 13:13)

Head: What is the passage saying?

Focusing on verse 13, here are three definitions:

Faith: confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see.

Hope: believing that things are going to get better than they are now.

Love: a commitment to seek the well-being of the other

- 1. What is the practical difference between having faith, and having faith in God?
- 2. What makes a Christian hope different than wishful thinking?
- 3. In the midst of discouragement, how can "hope" make perseverance possible?
- 4. What does Paul want us to know about love?

Heart: How does this passage influence my inner being?

- 1. How has this crisis revealed that you are more selfish or more caring?
- 2. Which of these virtues faith, hope, and love do you sense that God may be calling you to grow in?

Hands: How do I practically live this out?

Here are some practical ideas for this week. Or, you may have another idea that helps you practically live out what you are hearing from God. Share a practical, intentional step that can help you put into practice about what God is teaching you.

- 1. **Care:** Because these three remain faith, hope, and love be intentional this week to find an act of caring, when you feel like being selfish.
- 2. **Pray:** Join in <u>Every Day Prayer</u> this week (May 18-22). Be intentional this week to place your confident hope in God.
- 3. **Share:** Confident that these three remain faith, hope, and love take an intentional step this week to prepare yourself to share about the good news of Jesus. Be alert for a time to share the gospel.
- 4. Worship: Write out words of worship to God that reflect faith, hope, and love.
